
Theatre, Indpls Art Center, along with many private clubhouses throughout the city and surrounding areas.

Bean Supper on Friday, Sept 6th at the new time of 7 pm -- giving all our members additional time to arrive from a busy work week.





Freight Elevator

We have had an increased level of activity in the Cathedral this summer with the major construction project on a new freight elevator. This is one of the most extensive construction projects ever undertaken in terms of changing the structure. The entire stairwell on the south side of the tower has been gutted from the basement to the fourth floor in preparation for constructing the new elevator shaft. This includes removal of art glass windows, heating, cooling, electrical and several thousand pounds of marble steps. Several doors are blocked off and dust barriers erected with the material being carried out through the banquet hall.

It is a remarkable sight that will continue through an expected completion date of February 1, 2003. This major project is absolutely essential to improve transportation of food to the Ballroom and assist with equipment from major productions performing on our stage. It will also take a load off the current passenger elevators and allow us to return all four to passenger status without the abuse inflicted by food carts and other freight. The Trustees are also reviewing bids for an access ramp on the North side of the building. This would facilitate easier access to the building for deliveries and could double as a handicapped entrance.

Stay tuned for further developments at your Cathedral.

Learning Center News



"Shannon is making more progress this summer than she did all school year. She is actually reading on her own."

The comments of this thrilled parent reflect the effective work being done at the 32° Masonic Learning Center for Children. Fifty-two children received individual Orton-Gillingham tutoring during the summer. The increased enrollment at the Center was possible because six new tutoring rooms have been added.

Twenty-six newly trained tutors, ten of whom remain at the Learning Center this fall, provided some of our summer services. Training these teachers was a joint effort with our local branch of the International Dyslexia Association. For the first time, teachers receiving this training came from surrounding communities from as far away as Bloomington and Anderson

Indiana, which was big step in promoting our efforts.

Our Fall program begins on September 9th with a new schedule. Tutoring sessions are Monday through Thursday from 3:45 to 6:35 pm. Visitors are always welcome.

If you are interested in volunteering there are opportunities -- we will train you. While a Bachelor's Degree is required, you do not have to be a current teacher or have a degree in education to be eligible to tutor, just a willingness to help our children. The Column

Vitruvius: Roman Architect

Speculative Freemasonry uses the tools and language of the operative stonemason and the architect to illustrate its teachings. The most widely accepted theory of the origin of our fraternity is that it evolved from the Operative Masons of the Middle Ages. Those Operative Masons were actually

practicing two closely related fields of endeavor.

They were the craft of the stonemason combined with the profession of architecture. That the two fields were com-

bined is noted in the drama of the Master Mason Degree.

What we know about ancient architecture is from The Ten Books on Architecture by Vitruvius. Marcus Vitruvius Pollio was Roman who lived in the late second and early first centuries Before Christ. He was probably born in Formiae (now Formie) Italy. The date of his birth is unknown but he did die in 725 B. C.

So what is the importance of Vitruvius to architecture? According to the Microsoft

Encarta Encyclopedia he was an artillery engineer in the service of the first Roman emperor Augustus. The preface to his work is directly toward Augustus with what we would today consider an overdone

attempt at flattering the Roman Emperor. Vitruvius' ten books on architecture, De Architectura, are oldest surviving work on the subject. Much of the material appears to have been taken from what are now extinct works by Greek architects.

Professor Morris Hicky Morgan of Harvard University translated Vitruvius' work. This translation is in print and is currently published by Dover Publications.

The ten books cover a range of subjects and reflect both the architect and the engineer. Two of the books may have some special interest to Freemasons. Book III concerns itself with the building of ancient temples. The title of the first chapter of Book III is On Symmetry: In Temples and in the Human Body. Book IV is concerned with the orders of architecture. However, he only writes

of three orders: Corinthian, Doric, and Ionic.

The ninth book, which is concerned with the zodiac, may have some special interest to the Scottish Rite Masons who are members of the Valley of Indianapolis. On the floor of the Tyler's room in our Cathedral is the Zodiac.

The last and tenth book is concerned with engineering and his work as a military engineer. One can learn about such ancient weaponry of ballistae, catapults, and siege machines.

Vitruvius is not easy to read. As Professor Morgan notes in the preface to the Dover volume "he has all the

marks of one unused to composition, to whom writing is a painful task."

Vitruvius is honored in Indiana Freemasonry by the name of our fraternity's newest lodge, Lodge Vitruvian No. 676 in Indianapolis.

Our goal must be to seize these opportunities.

Freemasonry is not about what Masons do — Freemasonry is about who Freemasons are. Freemasonry is a "Covenant", a "Conviction" and a "Commitment". At the very essence of Freemasonry is the Covenant that binds a man to the fraternity. It is first uttered in response to the inquiries of the Entered Apprentice degree and completed when a brother whispers that Word when he is raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason. The obligations and ceremonies of our ritual is why we all know that we will always

help a Mason and he will always help us. That "Covenant" is meaningful because it is made among men who have a common "Conviction", that each man is able to control his own choices and actions and therefore is personally responsible for the consequences of those choices. And those choices are in large part a result of the "Commitment". The "Commitment" that man's purpose is to improve his own circumstances and those of the world around him.

I find it comforting in an age, too often defined by moral relevancy, selfish cynicism, and fanatic terrorism, that I am a Mason and know that my brother Masons can be trusted to act as much in my self-interest as they would in their own. If we can get this message to the good men we know, I think there are many who would like to associate themselves with us in our commitment to each other and to a better world.

Laying Tile - A Masonic Perspective

Our basement flooded this spring and we decided to replace the carpet with ceramic tile. The walls looked straight, parallel and perpendicular but I couldn't be sure. After 150+ hours of backbreaking labor I got a lot more out of the project than a nice floor. I relearned many of the basic lessons of Freemasonry. We're taught in our degrees to seek truth and deal on the level. I never appreciated what that meant until I had to sit and think about finding true squares and perpendiculars in an open space.

This became a metaphor for finding truth in my dealings with other people and an appreciation for how important truth is. A tile laid in one corner of the room ultimately affects all the tiles in the room. A lie has unforeseen consequences that may not be realized for some time. Lies are like crooked tiles that don't line up. Ultimately you need to 'fudge' somewhere to make the crooked tiles fit.

When I came back the next day I was horrified to find one tile grossly out of line right in the middle of the room! I was depressed that my beautiful work could be marred by an obvious mistake.

Humans are not prone to perfection and our ambitions in that regard are doomed to fail. We should be willing to accept the imperfections in ourselves and in those around us. We should do the best we can and be tolerant of ourselves and others who occasionally come up short. When my wife came downstairs to view the work she thought the floor looked great! She looked at the big picture by focusing on the bright appearance the new floor gave our basement, not the one tile that looked a little silly.

It was pretty amazing what that tile job taught me. Despite the sore muscles, bruised knees and cut fingers it was an experience I was glad to have. I got both a new floor and an new understanding about our Masonic lessons. What a deal!

Clarifying language will be voted on at the October Stated Meeting.
