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Jackhammers Replace Jingle Bells

Jackhammers have been working throughout the Summer and Fall preparing the Cathedral for the construction of a new freight elevator and entrance ramp from Walnut Street



into the Northeast corner of the building onto the mezzanine level. The stairwell on the East side of the building south of the tower has been gutted to provide the shaft

for the new elevator. A 65-foot hole is being drilled and nearing completion with a lot of dirt and rock being carried out through the banquet hall. Expected completion date is May 2003 culminating almost a year of planning and construction.

This is a major project made possible through the generous contributions of our members to the Scottish Rite Cathedral Foundation. Many individuals have made gifts ranging from onetime cash gifts, to multi-year pledges, deferred gifts of life insurance, and provisions in estate plans.

“ This renovation is absolutely necessary to improve transportation of food to the Ballroom and assist with bringing equipment and material to the stage” said **III Mac Maguire, 33°**, Chairman of the

Trustees. “It will also take a load off of the current passenger elevators and allow us to return all four to passenger status without the abuse inflicted by transporting freight.” The access ramp on the North side will facilitate easier



access to the building for deliveries and will double as a handicapped entrance.

The next project being studied by the Trustees is a “beautification” of the West Entrance including a double door vestibule and easier access from the drive.





Remember – "Winning is not a sometime thing."



Four years ago the 32° Masonic Learning Center for Children opened with twelve children attending. The Indianapolis Center was born. In January the last of these children graduated. With Erica's graduation the Center passes through infancy. For Erica it is also a passing that she and her parents express most accurately with their smiles and words of appreciation.

Of the first twelve students some only needed a year of tutoring to reach their grade level and some much longer. The Learning Center is able to work with children at any entering level. 

Campaign Nets \$60,000 Pledges

"A Word With You" 

Dad Power - It's Never Too Late

You never know what your kid's memories are going to be. Our son was I think 20 years old, he was in college, and they asked him to write about a childhood memory. Well he



picked the day that he and I played wiffle ball together for the first time. He couldn't have been more than 4 or 5 years old. The first time he ever tried to hit a ball he chopped it instead of hitting and missed it. Then I threw it again, real gently - Strike 2. So I stopped and I went over and I reviewed with him, you know, keep your eye on the ball - don't chop - swing evenly, and then I said one more thing that I hadn't said the first two times, I said, "Hey, Doug, I really believe you can do it". Well the next time, BAM! He hit that thing way over my head.



I want to have a word with you about "**Dad Power**". It comes from the Word of God I Thessalonians, Chapter 2, verse 7, "**We were gentle**

among you, like a mother caring for her young children". Verses 11 and 12 He says, "**You know that we dealt with each of you as a father deals with his own children, encouraging, comforting and urging you to live lives**

worthy of God, who calls you into his kingdom and glory".

In this book, Paul talks here about *spiritual* parenting, but it's really very good for those of us who are involved in the whole gamut of parenting our children. It talks about a mom's gentle acceptance and the gentle love of a mother. A father tends to have *expectation* love. Dads want you to get the job done, to do well. One parent usually is a little more the lover and the other a little more the tougher. It's good to put the two together.



Now Paul's fathering had great results. Most dads would start, of course, with urging. They like that word: As a father, I *urge* you to live as you should. But it also says dads are to encourage and to comfort. My experience with Doug in the yard tells us a lot of how our kids are wired. You know you don't just push them and nag them and point out when they're wrong - "Hey, man, you missed it." But you tell them that you believe in them - that's what works better. Kids need to know that. See, as a dad, we need to see the good points in our kids. Praise them often for those good points. Express what we see, in terms of their potential, what

they could be -- not just their strong abilities but their strong qualities like gentleness and sensitivity and leadership and a sense of humor, caring, and compassion. We often tend to see what needs work instead of what they are really good at.



God fathers like that. He called Abram, "Abraham - Father of Many Nations", before he was father of anything. He called Gideon, "Mighty Soldier", before he was ever much of a soldier. He called Simon, "The Rock", long before he was. Jesus says I see what you could be, not what you are. We need to do that with our kids. Maybe they're swinging and missing, but we got to tell them we believe they can hit. When we see weaknesses and failures, we have to start saying, "Hey, man, I know you can do better than this because I know who you are." A parent has awesome power to build up or to tear down and my son taught me what Paul told us and what God has modeled, that there is incredible parent power in encouraging and comforting and telling your child that you believe in him. *The same is true with work associates and for brothers in this great fraternity.*

Through the Cathedral Window

Shaker Power? A View from Pleasant Hill

A very enjoyable time in my Masonic travels occurred last June in Lexington, KY when I attended the annual Council of Deliberation. I enjoyed good food, good friends, and a chance to explore the countryside. Accompanied by my daughter Megan, I escorted Cheryl Sheets to the Shaker Village in nearby Pleasant Hill, KY while Dennis (our TPM) was "lodged" in meetings.

The Shakers, or United Society of Believers in Christ's Second Appearing, are the most enduring and successful of the many communal societies established in America in the 18th and 19th centuries. The first Shakers - so named because they shook and trembled to rid themselves of evil - came to America from England in 1774 seeking a place to freely practice their religious beliefs.


The early Shakers attracted converts who were impressed by the kind of spiritual relationship with God preached by founder Ann Lee. Converts gathered into communities, bound by their shared faith and a commitment to common property, celibacy, equality of men and women, pacifism and separation from the world. By the 1830's nineteen Shaker communities spread from Maine to Kentucky. Shakerism reached its peak by the Civil War with an estimated 6000 members.

Men and women lived separately as Brothers and Sisters as they sought to create their vision of "heaven on earth" by applying the virtues of simplicity, purity, and perfection to their work and to themselves.

Function and quality was emphasized in their products and designs. Their buildings were well constructed and appointed with efficient and modern amenities. Shakers are credited with a number of innovations and inventions and became successful businesspeople known for their honesty. The goods they produced for their own use were recognized worldwide for their quality.

The Shakers had never believed in marriage or bearing children and depended on conversions and adoptions to maintain their numbers. Their population began to decline with the industrial revolution, and so, one by one by the late 1800's communities began to close and, finally Pleasant Hill in 1910. The Shakers however, have left a strong legacy of accomplishments and an approach to life which remains relevant to people of the 21st century.

What is the point of this history lesson? Upon reflection a very startling similarity to Masonic history has occurred to me. What do you think? Is this our fate? Let me ask you: Is your son, cousin, business associate, or friend a brother? Are we relevant today?
