
Rotation of Officers Means Fresh Ideas



Learning Center Gets New Quarters in the Valley

All that noise and dust in the **Banquet Hall** the last few months is making way for the Masonic Learning Center for Children to move to its new home in the Cathedral. The Center has enjoyed a great relationship with North Park Lodge for the last five years, but with the Lodge contemplating a move to a different location, the Center will be pulling up stakes and occupying a brand new space on the South end of the Cathedral directly underneath the Cafeteria.

Dr. Kay Harmless, Chairman of the Learning Center Board of Governors, is excited about the facility as well as placing the location in a prominent place in the Cathedral. "This will help the

members of Scottish Rite see firsthand what a wonderful gift they are providing to the children who are served by the Center," indicated Dr. Harmless. The construction of the facility is under the supervision of the

Building and Grounds Committee with James R. Hale, 33° acting as the superintendent. The Center will be fully self-contained with the lobby and offices in space that was once part of the Banquet Hall. Approaching 75 years on North Street

Valley's Jubilee Celebration Just Around the Corner



This is the third in a series of articles concerning the history of the Scottish Rite Cathedral.

Please refer to previous issues of The Double Eagle.

Having acquired the entire one-half block on the West side of Meridian Street from North Street to Walnut Street, the Building committee was given permission to proceed. Since the building site was now larger than originally planned, all previous contracts were cancelled and the committee was instructed to place the plans for the new Cathedral in open competition. On June 23,

1924, the Trustees were ordered to proceed as rapidly as possible with the new Cathedral. Eight architects, all

members of the Rite, entered the competition, were granted an interview and by secret ballot

the plans submitted by George F. Schreiber of Indianapolis were adopted.

In speaking of a Cathedral, the idea comes that it is a house of God and then follows the thought of our Saviour, whose life on earth was thirty-three years. The figure "thirty-three"

also represents the highest degree of Scottish Rite Masonry. What better combination for a basic idea could there be than a tribute to the Grand Architect of the Universe along with a portrayal in stone of the symbolism of the Order handed down in legend from King Solomon's Temple on Mount Moriah and perfected in a modern Christian philosophy?"

After his selection as the

architect, nearly two and a half years were spent drawing, elaborating and perfecting his plans. In keeping with the theme expressed above, the dimensions of thirty-three feet and sixteen and a half feet, or multiples thereof, were used for the floor elevations, column spacing and room sizes. The Tudor period of Gothic design was selected for the exterior.

The ornamentation of the exterior was designed not only to be decorative but also to display Masonic Symbolism. Thus, any Mason entering the Cathedral's main entrance

would observe many allusions to his Symbolic Lodge - The busts of Solomon, King of Israel; Hiram, King of Tyre; and Hiram Abiff

surrounded by many other symbolic emblems from the first three degrees of Masonry.

On January 10, 1927 the Building Committee gave its

final approval of the plans. The cost of construction was not to exceed \$2,000,000. Consequently, on April 6, 1927, a resolution was presented by

total of \$1.9 million. The stock bore a dividend rate of 2-3/4%

20,000 shares of \$100 preferred stock were sold to raise construction funds

payable semiannually, or \$55,000 on November 1st and May 1st. The

agreement also called for the principal sum to be repaid at the rate of \$60,000 each May 1st from 1932 to 1951, with a final

> payment of \$800,000 due in 1952. The preferred stock was sold and contracts for construction were let on April 21, 1927.

Notwithstanding the many trials and tribulations it faced, the final payment was made and the Indianapolis Scottish Rite Cathedral was debt free before January 1, 1952.
