


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
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The Spirit of Giving

The Board of Governors of the Children's Dyslexia Center of Indianapolis is justifiably proud, as you can imagine. Hundreds of children have been served by our organization over the past quarter century (this year is our 25th Anniversary.) They have had opportunities for success opened to them as they learned to read. What a wonderful legacy this is. Our success today carries forward into the future for more than a generation to come! Today's readers are tomorrow's leaders. The Board thanks the Scottish Rite, on behalf of the children and their families, for this wonderful charity.

But there is more! We have trained scores of tutors in our program based on the latest research-based techniques to help children suffering from dyslexia. We use the Orton-Gillingham method for multisensory teaching and our national Scottish Rite organization provides all the training materials and certifications for our tutors. It is a comprehensive and strenuous training program; however, it is essential that our tutors are fully trained and qualified to help the children.

There are 46 Scottish Rite Dyslexia Centers in the United States and all of them are staffed by professionals who teach the children, keep records, compile reports, and conduct research studies. They do all the work needed to keep the organization working effectively. Although the Board of Governors is made up entirely of volunteers who receive no pay, our staff is made up of paid and certified professionals. In addition to paying our staff, there are other costs to be considered as well. We need to cover rent, purchase training materials, pay for tax and insurance services, and buy books, supplies, and office equipment. That is, there are costs involved in running a program like ours.

We must also note that we do this as a Masonic service to the community. Our students' families do not pay for this program. Really! Our work is a gift

to the community. We depend upon the support of our members and others to keep the doors open. For a quarter century we have done so...and we say thank you to all who have helped.

How do we pay for these expenses? The Board of Governors works hard all year to raise funds for our Indianapolis Center. In this we are supported by Scottish Rite members who donate annually when renewing their memberships. We also appreciate numerous community organizations who support our work through grants to our program. These include grants from Lilly Endowment, Central Indiana Community Foundation, the Williams Jefferson Trust, and others. There are also Masonic groups, such as the Widow's Sons, who have been remarkably generous through their annual motorcycle ride to benefit the Children's Dyslexia Center of Indianapolis. It is a joy to see the riders on the road knowing the good work they support!

We depend upon the support of our members and others to keep the doors open.

We hold an annual Spring Bingo that attracts repeat bingo players who enjoy the friendship and fun at the event. Last year several attendees made special donations to the Center including table sponsors, game sponsors, and some who handed cash donations to be credited to the Center. We thank each and everyone one who helped us in this way!

Moreover, the Children's Dyslexia Center receives support from Masonic lodges and Eastern Star chapters from all over Indiana. (We should note we are the ONLY Scottish Rite Dyslexia Center in Indiana.) Such Masonic donations are essential for the success of our mission. We appreciate gratefully all of those who help us do this important work.



The Children's Dyslexia Center of Indianapolis is one of 187 organizations to receive a grant through Strengthening Youth Programs in Indiana, a major initiative from Lilly Endowment Inc. Our Center was selected as a recipient of a \$150,000 grant from Lilly Endowment to help pay for the staff supporting the Indianapolis Center over the next three years.

We are extremely grateful to Lilly Endowment for this generous grant in support of our operations. We look forward to tutoring more children, helping them achieve success in reading, in school, and in life. Julie Bohannon, the Director of our Center recently noted, "For 25 years, the Children's Dyslexia Center of Indianapolis has partnered with local communities to assist youth in regaining confidence and building self-esteem through proven methods for reading instruction, tutoring, and dyslexia remediation."

I didn't know that he was a brother until after entering his hospital room. He was very confused and was upset because he didn't know what was happening because he couldn't remember what had been said to him.



good and asked "what is this," as I gave the pass grip for a Master Mason. He gave the word and calmly said with a smile "I am safe with you, my brother."

His energy, mood and body was now calm and no longer stressed. My partner came into the room with the nurse and they were shocked at how much of a change the patient had made. I told them it's hard to explain but we are both Freemasons and had a special connection.

As we were loading the patient into the ambulance, he suddenly panicked again. He looked at me and said "I feel like I should know you. Where am I going, what is happening to me?" I calmly said "you are being taken to the place whence you came." He relaxed and answered "To be reinvested of what I had been divested. Let's go my brother I know that I am safe and in good hands."

I was and still am surprised how much those grips and words meant to him. I had not been a Mason for very long at that point. It shows how much something that seems to be so insignificant can be life changing and in the process of being lost, a grip and word will fix everything. We all learn during our first degree to follow our guide and fear no danger.

Brother Jackson also shared a personal health miracle with me, of being healed from Parkinson's after a grueling yet successful 12 hour surgery. This is one great man I was happy to get to talk to, and who was more than happy to converse with a young Brother.

Then there is Brother William "Bill" Belt from Beechgrove, who responded to one of my emails I had sent him and stated he had some things to donate to the Scottish Rite. I gladly called him up and we got to set up a time to meet for lunch together.

We ended up going to Culver's, unfortunately Brother Bill's blood sugar was off and he wasn't feeling well enough to eat. Undeterred, he sat there while I had a quick bite and we talked about our families. Our Brother had just recently lost the love of his life Barbara in December of 2023 and was still mourning her loss.

Before we parted ways, he mentioned wanting to come to a Stated Meeting and that he also had his late wife's clothes he'd like to donate. So a couple of days before our Stated Meeting in February I arranged to pick him up and get there early enough so we could drop the clothes off to the Wheeler Mission downtown. Regrettably, Brother Belt was not feeling well enough to attend but I was able to stop by his house and pick up eight bags of clothes to bless those who could use them. He often donates his own clothes and jackets to local support groups to give back to his hometown.

These are but a few examples of the good men and Masons I've gotten the favor to meet and interact with in my life and Masonic journey so far. I could go on for days and weeks about the 100's of fellow Freemasons, Scotties, Sir Knights, Companions, and Cousins I've personally met and talked to in my short five years in this fraternity...the mentors, the supporters, the givers, the uplifters, the leaders, the laborers, the influencers, the optimists, the encouragers, the examples, and the ones we aspire to be.

I am not only honored to call Jarrett my brother, but also a very close friend!






